## MEMORIES OF AL MUNDAY

I first came across Al Munday in 1974 when he was driving Minis in conjunction with Graeme Ibbotson and the Wigger brothers. We were all in Sports Sedans and it was a real hoot. Al had been racing at speedway and had a heap of knackered Mini stuff at his place, but he was already cleaning up his act and putting some good cars together. A plumber by trade, he turned his hand fairly easily to the intricacies of Mini gearboxes and motors, and was already collecting a retinue of Mini owners who valued his growing expertise and his ready willingness to help others. I knew even less about Minis then than I do now, and always found it rewarding talking Minis with him.

I then fell into matrimony and didn't see Al until the late 80s when he came back to Wanneroo, in an Appendix J Mini. Al didn't look or perform any differently. He was as irreverent, helpful and argumentative as always, and smoked just as much. He also kept two small Jack Russells who proved to be world champions at jumping up the front of visitors, in tandem, which was a bit startling at times. Little was I to know that Barb and I would be managing a very similar lunatic dog (Tenterfield Terrier) many years later, and I still recall those days at Al's place in Jarrah Road when it does its magical jumping act. Also, I was grateful to Al for his housekeeping skills as they were even less developed than mine, which I felt strangely comforting.

On the track, Al was an odd combination of gentleman driver and hard pedaller. On the occasions that we were in company out there I never found him to be an easy mark. Nor could I complain about his track manners. But if I felt that I was getting on top of him he would do something different and make me revise my strategy. On occasions, as a spectator, I was able to watch him in action. I well remember a Night Masters evening on the short track when he served up all those around him with what seemed to be comparative ease. It must have been quite humbling for some of the faster cars whose drivers doubtless believed they belonged in front of him rather than behind. If you keep your head down and don't ever give up, eventually you get to experience a day when everything clicks and you know you have done something memorable. For me, that was

Al's greatest moment, and told all who didn't already know that Al was well and truly capable of great stuff.

I am reminded of an occasion that was a part of the great bonhomie that existed in Appendix J. It was a Skywest Cup event in, I think, 1990 and we had competitors from over East, so we were keen to present and maintain a full grid. Ian Sharp, an EH driver, got tangled up in a first lap, first corner skirmish and finished up clouting the fence outside the Esses. He had damage to the boot and the front left wing, and the triple Weber carburetors and one carburetor got damaged. Sharpie disappeared somewhere to sulk but Al and a few others had an appraising look at the EH. It was decided that it could be repaired sufficiently to get back on the track, so Al got the carburetors back into good nick and others repaired this and that. Finally, with only about 10 minutes to the start, someone asked where Sharpie was, and eventually he was brought back and belted up in the EH. He was more surprised than anyone to discover that his car was ready to go again, thanks to Al and a few others. Sharpie went out and drove over a second lap quicker than previously, which nobody could explain – until he owned up to having downed a couple of quiet Swan Lagers when he thought his day was all over. And without Al being there, perhaps the car wouldn't have even made it back on to the track. Al applied this never say die attitude to his own racing and, it seems, to how he lived his life in general. I am glad I knew the guy well enough to appreciate his qualities. He'll be missed.

# Mini convoy pays a moving tribute to former racer

BUSSELTON residents were witness to a curious sight last Tuesday when a convoy of 20 Minis drove into town.

The procession was a moving tribute to popular Mini enthusiast Alan Munday, organised by the Southern Districts Mini Club.

His sister Margaret Toolin said more than 160 people attended the tribute service at William Barrett and Sons funeral home.

Born in 1953 in the Wheatbelt town of Kondinin, Mr Munday picked up his early interest in cars from his father Hubert, a self-taught mechanic.

Mrs Toolin said his first job was in irrigation and he later owned a reticulation business before moving into repairing and restoring Minis.

She said Mr Munday raced various cars, including Mini No. 97 at Wanneroo, a car brought to the service by its current owner Mike Kozieradzki.

Mr Munday was club president and 1994 State Champion of Appendix J (now the WA Historic Touring Car Club), a member of the WA Mini Car Club and was actively involved in the SDMC.

Mrs Toolin said SDMC members were almost like a second family to him, and family ties also remained strong throughout his life.

Mrs Toolin said Mr Munday and the family received wonderful support after his lung

cancer diagnosis in 2009, with thanks given to Dr Caldow and Associates, Silver Chain, the Hospice and Cape Care Ray Village.

"He will be sadly missed by his brother and sisters, nieces and nephews, great nieces and nephew, and many friends," she said.
